

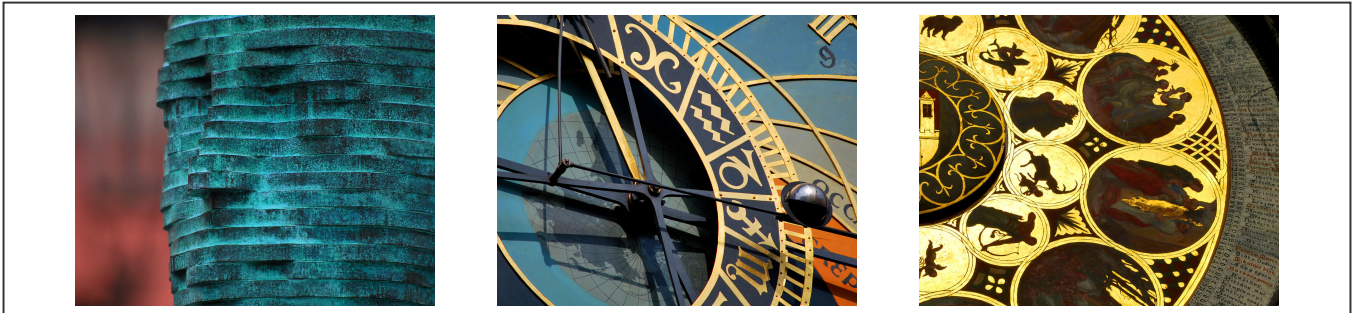

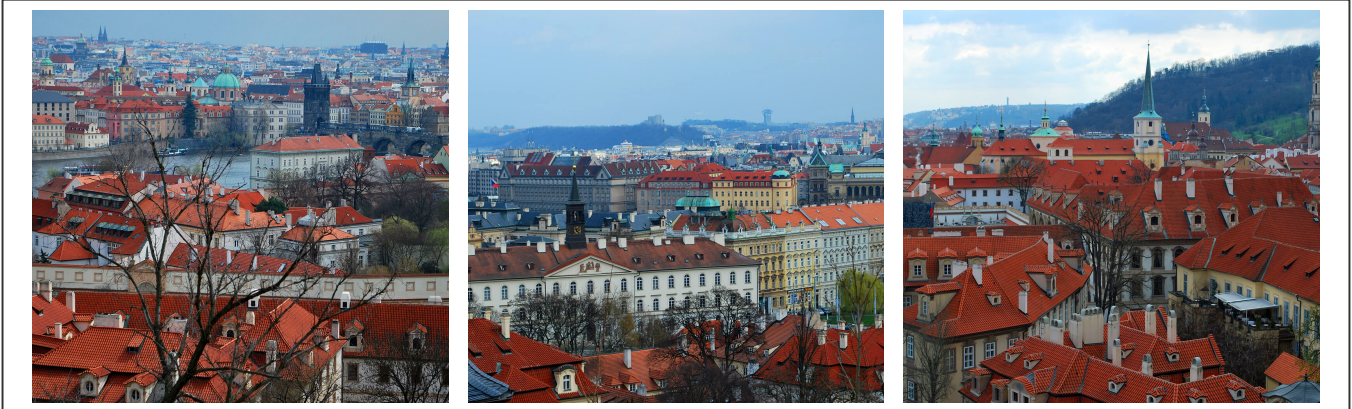

to Franz Kafka, a 20th century writer born in Prague.

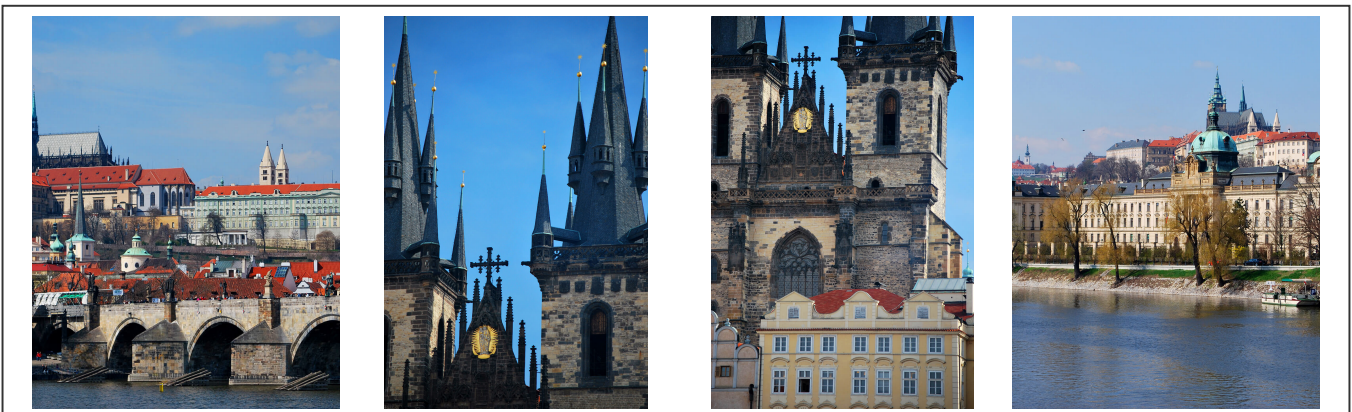

Prague Castle

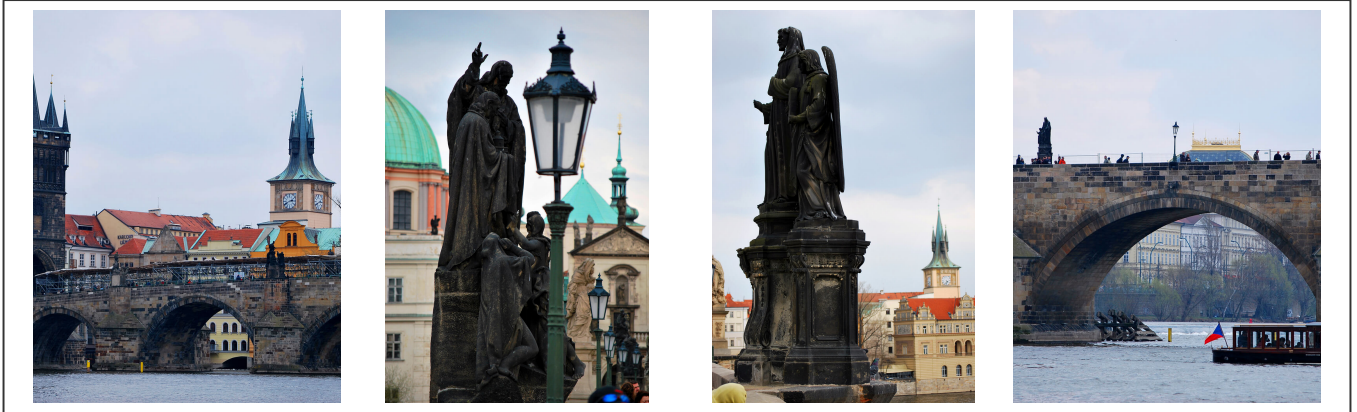
The Prague Castle was built in the **8th century**. It currently serves as the office of the Czech parliament.

Astronomical clock

The Astronomical Clock is attached to the Old City Hall, located in the old downtown district. It includes, at its bottom, **a representation of the earth and the sky**. The upper ring represents the **12 signs of the zodiac**. The position of the sun and moon is represented by needles.

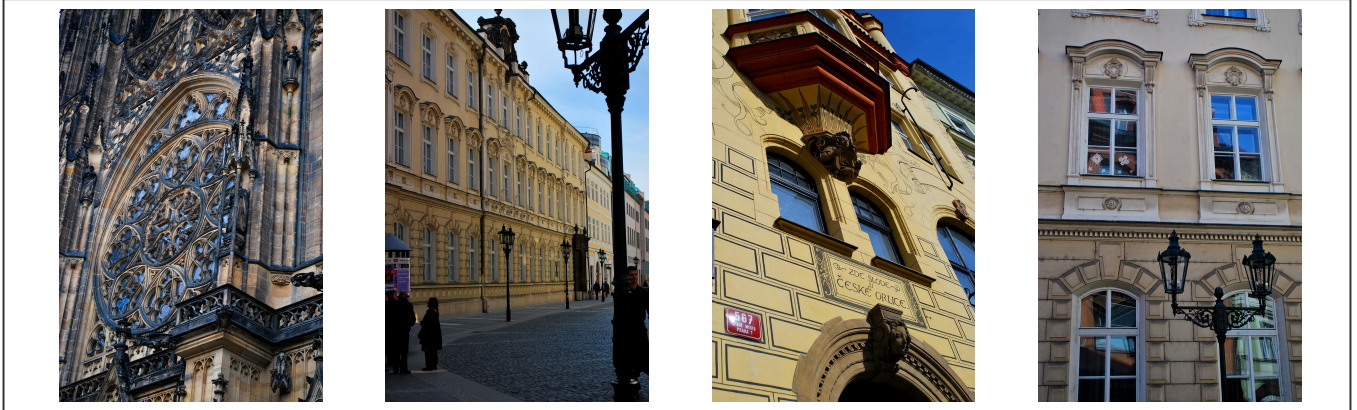


The astronomical clock and the calendar

The city is full of beautiful buildings, colorful facades, finely carved sculptures.

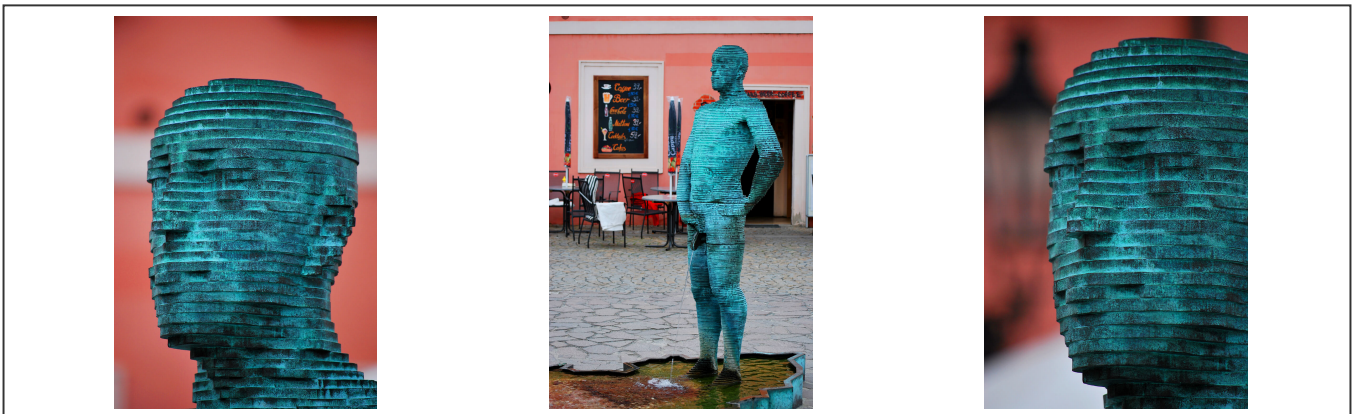

Franz Kafka Museum

A museum dedicated to Franz Kafka, a famous writer, born in Prague in the late **19 century**. German-speaking, Kafka was famous for his writing that was halfway between realism and fantasy. The adjective **"Kafkaesque"** often refers to something absurd or illogical, somewhat along the lines of the mindless texts written by the author.
